



Overview

Brief Description:

This course explores the development of Catholic social teaching within its historical and political context, striving to understand the Church's ongoing efforts at instructing and guiding its pilgrim members in the "human things" of society, politics, and economics. Students will explore the papal encyclicals that respond to various socio-political challenges of the modern era: from Pope Leo XIII's *Rerum Novarum* (1891) and labor disputes, through the 20th-century struggles with totalitarianism, to Pope Francis' *Laudato Si* (2015) and stewardship of creation. Key themes include human dignity, the common good, subsidiarity, solidarity, marriage and the family, preferential option for the poor, and the dynamic relationship between religion and politics.
