The International Relations sphere increasingly defines and shapes our domestic politics, our economic development, our cultural framework and our daily lives. From a purely Inter-State conception, the academic study of International Relations has been incorporating new actors and transnational phenomena that have been shaping a complex, interrelated and constantly evolving global system. Global Media, massive migrations, social movements, multinationals companies and the global digital communication irruption are some of these phenomena that are increasing both the World Politics complexity and the international impact towards the domestic dynamics.

In this course, students will acquire the conceptual and methodological tools necessary to understand international reality, analyze its evolution and identify the factors and subjects that shape its dynamics.

The sessions methodology will be participatory, dynamic and interdisciplinary. These sessions will be composed of both theoretical and practical sessions in which students will perform presentations on various global issues applying their creativity, teamworking skills and analytical abilities. In order to reinforce the knowledge acquisition, the presentation will be complemented with public debates, audiovisual resources exhibitions, computer practices and international cases resolution contests employing the main international organizations' databases.

ACTIVIDADES FORMATIVAS

<u>Oral presentations</u>: The student must perform, in groups, **2 oral presentation** on a international topic. The teacher will guide both the subject choice and the subsequent debate. The oral presentation can include graphs, pictures, audiovisual elements and Powerpoint presentation. Both the research work and the presentation will be assessed. After the exposition, a debate moderated by the professor will be performed with the rest of the students on the topic explained.

Each presentation will be 10% of the final mark. In total: 20% of the final mark.

<u>Case Resolution</u>: The professor will explain how to research employing the UN Treaty database and, subsequentially, will present different questions related to World Politics. The student will have to solve it, in groups, by accessing the main international institutions' databases like the UN Treaty database. Teamworking skills, creativity, criteria and empiric-based answers will be assessed.

The case resolution activity will have a weight of 5% in the final mark.

Short essays and debates: For each lesson, the professor will upload a small reading on the lesson's main ideas and a list of short questions. The student will have to read it, reflect about it and critically answer the questions briefly and concisely in a document. In each lesson a small debate will be conducted where the students will participate, in turns, to share their views and ideas that have been reflected in the document. At the end of the semester, the student will submit to the professor all the answers that has been elaborating during the course in a single document. Both the participation in the debates and the writing job will be assessed. Critical thinking, creativity, and capacity to dialogue and debate constructively will be valued.

The short essays and debate activity will have a weight of 5% in the final mark.

EVALUACIÓN



CONVOCATORIA ORDINARIA

The final mark of the course will be based on the elements listed below. Both the practical part and the theoretical part must be passed in order to pass the course:

I Final Exam: 70% of the final mark

The final exam will consist of a test and/or a series of questions in which the student must demonstrate the acquisition of the theoretical knowledge taught in the subject.

Value: 70% of the final mark.

II Practical part: 30% of the final mark

II.I Oral expositions

Set of oral presentations in which the student will deep in International Relations aspects and specific cases. These exhibitions will be held in groups and the grade will be the same for all group members.

Value: 20 % of the final mark.

II.II Case Resolution

A set of International Relations real cases presented to the students and they will must to solve them in groups using the main international organizations databases, legislation and international jurisprudence. The note will be the same for all the members of the group.

Value: 5% of the final mark.

II.III Short essays and debates



Individual research deepening in World Politics readings through a Q&A document and a debate on the answers. The document must be done individually and there will be a brief debate with all the class for each reading on the conclusions reached by the student.

Value: 5% of the final mark.
