EDUCATIONAL ACTIVITIES

In this course, you will have the opportunity to learn new skills in English in order to prepare for your professional future:

- CBT interview: role- play: psychologist and patient
- Role play: consultation with a patient or family member; note taking and preparing follow-up report
- Pair work: exchanging opinions and expressing ideas in professional contexts
- Understanding and using questionnaires
- Reading academic texts and papers
- Preparing 1 academic writing and 1 academic paper
- Active listening: practice in advanced level exercises
- Consolidation of vocabulary used in readings and listenings

ASSESSMENT

5%: First speaking activity

10%: Simulation task (interview with a patient)

10%: First writing assignment (academic essay)

10% Report (notes)

15%: Second writing assignment (academic research paper)
