



PRESENTACIÓN

Breve descripción: This course will introduce students to world literature in English, from the beginning of English literature as such and until the 19th century included. It provides an overview of the context in which each of these great British, Irish and American literary works is inscribed, and promotes active engagement with critical literature. It also allows for reading and writing academically, as well as honing essay writing skills.

- Overview of the subject: centuries, historical periods and genres to be discussed in seminars

 - Nathaniel Hawthorne. Sci-fi stories: "Rappaccini's Daughter," "The Birthmark"
 - Oscar Wilde. *The Importance of Being Earnest*
 - Charlotte Perkins Gilman. "The Yellow Wallpaper"

EDUCATIONAL ACTIVITIES

Methodology:

The class will function as a seminar, with students reading the texts assigned and participating actively in discussions. Class attendance and active engagement with the material, as well as prompt submission of requirements are expected and essential to passing the course. The educational activities are detailed below.

Time distribution:

- Seminars: 60 hours
- Tutorials: 2 hours
- Students' reading and studying time: 55 hours
- Preparing assignments and essays: 33 hours

ASSESSMENT

The final grade will be calculated based on the following division:

- In-class participation: 15%
- Elaboration of guided work:
 - Quizzes/assignments: 15%
 - Two critical/creative essays: 40%
- Final exam/essay: 30%

EXTRAORDINARY CALL



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- Students who fail because they have not met their course requirements will sit the June exam. The exam will consist of a set of theoretical questions to develop and count 80% of the final grade. 20% will be assigned to an additional reading comprehension quiz. If any of the ordinary call parts has been passed in May, a partial grade can be retained for the benefit of the student, with percentages adjusted to ensure they can achieve a potential 100%.
- If a student wishes to improve their overall grade in the course, they will also be able to do so. The criteria will be the same as per students who had failed. However, if that student fails to take the exam in June or their overall grade is below 5, they will fail the course and be obliged to take it again the following academic year.

Students with special learning needs

Accommodation will be provided for students with special learning needs, either regarding the methodology and/or evaluation of the course, but they will be expected to fulfill all course objectives.

N.B. In case of plagiarism in any of the tasks assigned and/or irregularities such as cheating and/or copy-pasting unoriginal material, the student will fail and/or be penalized, depending on the severity of the case, and a note may be made on their academic record.
