COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is designed to teach Nursing Students how to conduct an interview with a patient in English. It follows a modern, patient-centric approach based on Gordon's 11 functional patterns. Although the medical practitioner leads the dialogue, the patient is encouraged to share their ideas, concerns and expectations regarding their concerns. Course participants are therefore taught the subtleties and nuances of the interviewing technique which fosters rapport with, and empathy for, the patient's condition.

PROGRAM

The course will cover the following topics:

B. Getting Started with the Interview

C. Triggering the Patterns

D. Advanced Information Gathering

E. Past Medical, Family History & Social History



F. Exam Practice

In addition, course participants will learn

1. grammar for the formulation and appropriateness of the different question types
2. vocabulary related to medical terminology
3. how to navigate between medical terminology and their everyday equivalents
4. commonly used phrases, expressions and phrasal verbs

EDUCATIONAL ACTIVITIES

100 minute session per class, during the first semester of the academic year 2025-2026

- A wide range of pedagogical activity types will be employed, including individual, pair and group work
- Practical in-class role-playing sessions with reinforcing feedback loops

EVALUATION

The evaluation for the course will be based on the following sections:

A **written mid-term exam** consisting of a Listening (a nurse interviewing a patient), and Grammar and Vocabulary tasks (**25%** of the final grade).

A **final written exam** consisting of a Listening (a nurse interviewing a patient), and Grammar and Vocabulary (**25%** of the final grade):

- vocabulary exercises testing knowledge and use of key phrases used when taking a clinical history;
- a listening exercise based on a recording of a nurse-patient interview.

An **final oral exam** where the student will be expected to conduct an interview with a patient. Students will be evaluated both on their interviewing technique, the use of grammar and vocabulary, and the quality and accuracy of the written notes they take (**50%** of the final grade).

Mid-term exam: to be confirmed.

Final written exam: to be confirmed.

Final oral exam (interviews): to be confirmed.

ORDINARY CALL

The assessment of the above mentioned linguistic abilities in the ordinary call comprises four components: a **mid-term exam 25%** of the subject, a **final oral interview 50%** of the subject and a **final written exam 25%** of the subject. The dates are detailed below.

1. The in-person **mid-term** exam, takes place during the class period and consists of three parts: vocabulary, listening and grammar. This exam can only be taken once on the day and time stated. If the student does not sit the mid-term they forfeit the 25% grade for the course and receive a 0 for this component of the course.



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2. The **final oral exam** will be an in-person, face-to-face **oral interview**. The grade for the interview is 50% of the final course. A no show to the interview will be awarded a 0 grade for this component of the course.
3. The **final written exam**, in-person and on paper and comprises three parts: listening, vocabulary and grammar. This exam can only be taken once on the day and time stated. If the student does not sit the exam they forfeit the 25% grade for the course and receive a 0 for this component of the course.

EXTRAORDINARY CALL

The extraordinary call consists of two components: a written exam 50% of the course grade and an oral exam 50% of the course grade.

1. The **written exam** is in-person, and will take place in **June 2027**. It consists of three sections: listening, grammar and vocabulary.
2. The **oral exam** is an in-person, face-to-face exam and will take place in **June 2027** after the written exam. The oral exam format is one student with one or two examining teachers.

To pass the extraordinary call, it is necessary to have a score of 50 or above of the accumulated total of the written and oral components.

The extraordinary call may be taken in the following scenarios:

- The student has failed the subject in December or has not taken the final exam in the ordinary call in December. In this case, the student must take the two components of the extraordinary call. There is no carry over of grades from coursework or semester assessment (mid-term).
- The student has requested to take the extraordinary call having been awarded a grade of 5 or higher in the ordinary call. In this case, the student must take the two components of the extraordinary call and the grade awarded for the extraordinary call will be the grade which corresponds to the course. The grade from the extraordinary call may be higher, equal to or lower (including fail) to the grade originally awarded at the ordinary call. It should be noted that once attendance to the extraordinary call has been requested they must sit the exam, if they do not take the exam (a no show) then the grade will be a "No Presentado" on their academic record and they will have to retake the subject the following academic year.

SPECIAL NEEDS

Students with special needs can be given 25% extra time in in-person written and oral exams. For this, students must submit a formal request to the faculty at the start of the semester and support their request with the necessary documentation.

EXTRAORDINARY CIRCUMSTANCES



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Students who are subject to extraordinary circumstances (bereavement, hospitalisation, etc.) at the time of assessed activities (coursework, mid-terms, oral interviews, final exams) must communicate their situation to the faculty and course teacher as soon as possible. Their situation and assessment will be considered on a case by case basis.
